Students launched 2024 goal setting using a Vision (Image) board as their tool to help them envision their goals.

Job skills highlights: We assumed mock roles as store owner entrepreneurs, identified products we would sell, what we would pay our employees, how many hours we would have them work a week as well as vacation days given. 

Ask The Advocate is a training series to help families and caregivers to prepare for the future of their loved ones who have disabilities. The topics covered will help you better navigate through the Special Education and Community Mental Health systems, help you to prepare financially while preserving government benefits, and give you the information you'll need to plan for your loved one's future goals.

Sep 12th	Supported Decision Making	Topics covered include person-centered planning, Power of Attorney, Patient Advocates, and Guardianship
Oct 10th	Creative Housing Options	Learn about the variety of ways to support individuals to lead a healthy life in a home of their choosing.
Nov 14th	Special Education Services	Hear representatives from Michigan Alliance for Families discuss skills that parents can use to become more effective advocates for your child with a disability.
Jan 9th	Navigating Medicaid Supports	Topics covered include how to apply for Medicaid and other benefits through Department of Health and Human Services, what Medicaid covers and how to access those services.

Hub program and expectations.
